President's Report

Australia's Right to Repair Legislation: 3 Years On



Events this week with a friend's 20 year old European sports car got me thinking about Australia's right to repair legislation. The car is stuck in limp mode with the dash warning lights lit up like a Christmas tree and it is proving quite difficult to access a scanning tool that will work with the cars pre OBD2 proprietary software.

<u>The Motor Vehicle Service and Repair Information Sharing Scheme Act 2021</u> (or often referred to in broader terms as the "Right to Repair" legislation) played a pivotal role in reshaping how certain diagnostic, repair and servicing information for motor vehicles can be accessed by repairers and Registered Training Organisations.

Since its inception in 2021, availability of such information to independent workshops and repairers beyond traditional OEM-authorised dealers levelled the playing field and enabled consumers broader choice of access to their preferred repairer or dealer.

3 years later...

Over time, independent workshops and repairers have largely benefited from the Scheme with consumers and fleets showing strong preference to obtain servicing and repairs through independent workshops and servicing channels.

Research indicates that such independent workshops now account for an overall 60% of all service and repair activities within Australia, with future projections of further 20% increases in such activities each year by 2030. Such shift in consumer preference to use independent mechanics and servicing centres are largely associated with higher consumer trust and competitive pricing offered by such workshops. I am glad that the scheme has been considered a success, but it is not a lot of help with the car that I am helping on.

FIRES IN EV BATTRIES

In November 2022 I wrote about an E-scooter being charged and the battery exploding in an underground car park in North Sydney.



scooters, bicycles and power tools.

The fire destroyed an Aston Martin and damaged a number of other vehicles. At the time, I pondered what would have happened if it had been an EV car battery. Well, now we know because it happened very recently in South Korea with an electric Mercedes exploding into an intense fire in a car park below a multi storey residential building. Despite firefighters efforts, it burned for 8 hours and destroyed 140 vehicles. Toxic smoke caused 21 people to be hospitalized and there was serious structural damage to the building. Not surprisingly, their government is talking about banning EVs from being charged in underground car parks. There will be some big queues on the street chargers! The Merc was fitted with a Chinese made NMC (nickel, manganese, cobalt) battery, in which Mercedes have invested a lot of faith - and money.

As at 23/08/24 there have been 185 fires in NSW caused by L-ion batteries in

Finally on EV cars, if you get a nail or screw in your tyre, you apparently cannot just have it plugged in the normal way. The tyres are of a different compound to ICE car tyres to carry the extra weight of the battery and reduce rolling resistance (less grip??) They also have sound deadening foam inside them and, if it is possible to plug the tyre at all, it has to be done from the inside, more complicated and more expensive – especially when you don't have a spare wheel!

Top Gear

Occasionally, just occasionally, one of those unsolicited messages on the 'device', demands a second look. And one appeared on my mobile yesterday. It's gone now of course, to be replaced by the usual inane articles on issues the cyberspace algorithm deduces you may find interesting. But this one – 'Only two manual cars now produced in the USA', had my attention. The article went on to reveal that the Mustang GT and Cadillac Blackwing were the only remaining cars in the States to be fitted with a manual gearbox. It further opined the writing was well and truly on the wall for the old 'stick shift', indeed the Mustang Ecoboost no longer offer the manual option and the V8, probably not too far behind. It's hardly surprising. Having driven both the manual and auto versions of the Mustang, there is little doubt the auto is both quicker in terms of acceleration and more economical too. Even Lewis Hamilton in a



manual would struggle to outpace the super smooth 10 speed auto with its paddle shift. A purist will argue a manual better connects you to the car and provides a more visceral experience. This may be true, but in reality an auto in the city is a nobrainer, it requires little or no maintenance and replacing the clutch becomes a thing of the past. And it must be said, a certain demographic finds manual shifting a challenge after various joint replacements.

Most Club members would almost certainly have learned to drive on a manual. In my case it was 1965 and my dad's

Wolseley 15/60, a more luxurious version of the Austin Cambridge and Morris Oxford. And just about the very first thing he told me was: 'Careful with first gear, there's no synchro'. Didn't have a clue what he meant of course, but quickly discovered changing down from second to first whilst still in motion elicited unpleasant grinding noises from beneath the Wilton carpet. And so began a lifelong association with the beloved manual. My very first car a humble Minivan, had a rather sloppy '4 on the floor' transmission. Passed my driving test in it and it



was also my first experience with vehicle maintenance – SU fettling, repacking wheel bearings and of course, the inevitable clutch replacement.

There followed a number of manuals, the most unusual almost certainly the oddball Renault 4. The gearlever protruded horizontally from the dash with a connecting rod going through the firewall, across the tiny engine to a bracket near the radiator where it took a 90



degree turn and plunged vertically to a three speed gearbox mounted at the front of the motor. Only the French you might think could come up with such an odd design, but at the same time (late 60s) I had a friend with a Borgward Isabella. It had a 4 speed manual column mounted shift. One can only imagine the complex system of levers, cables and pulleys required to reach the gearbox, let alone operate it and it certainly couldn't be rushed. Its owner, an engineer, delighted in its eccentricity. In 1969 I became the proud owner of an Austin Healey 100M and for the first time discovered the joys of overdrive. In this case a Laycock de Normanville unit and it was a delight to reach top gear, flip the switch and hear the revs drop as a 5th cruising gear kicked in. This overdrive unit appeared in a number of British cars, including Jensen, Triumph and Vauxhall before making an appearance in Volvo, Chevrolet, AMC and even the Ferrari 250GT 2 + 2. The very early Healey 100/4 (BN1) had first gear blocked off as the very low ratio was prone to damage the spline or spokes in rear wheels. My grandson recently passed his driving test. I had suggested he might consider learning to drive a manual with a view to one day driving my car. His response suggested he would rather give up his

precious phone. And right there we find the silver lining - Anyone under the age of thirty, perhaps even forty, will not be capable of stealing your classic, but only if it's a manual...
